

# Welcome to Kindergarten!

Get your child ready for kindergarten. Make sure their immunizations are up-to-date. Make sure they get all of the recommended health screenings.

### **Immunizations**

Two free vaccines are recommended for children age 4 and older:

- Tdap-IPV to protect against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough (pertussis), and polio.
- MMRV to protect against measles, mumps, rubella and chickenpox (varicella).

Schedule your child's immunization by calling your doctor, pharmacist, or Public Health Unit.

Report immunizations to your public health unit. Call your health unit or complete the online form.

## **Public Health Services**

You can consult a Public Health nurse at your local Public Health Unit. Services include, but are not limited to the following:

- Immunizations
- Child health screenings
- Educational health and safety resources

# Dental, Vision, and Hearing

#### Dental screening

Kindergarten students receive a free dental check in school. We do this to find and help children who have dental problems. This screening should not replace an exam done by a dentist.

#### Vision

We encourage all parents/guardians to make an appointment to visit their local optometrists for their child's yearly eye exam. It is free.

In B.C., basic eye exams are free up to the age of 18, although some optometrists might charge a small user fee for each visit.

#### Hearing

Good hearing is essential for speech and language development and plays an important part in a child's social and emotional growth.

Community audiologists provide hearing services for children from birth to 19 years of age.

For children who have hearing concerns, a parent/guardian or a health or education professional can refer the child to the local public health audiology clinic.

Some children might qualify for free basic dental, eyeglasses, and hearing coverage from the BC Healthy Kids Program.
